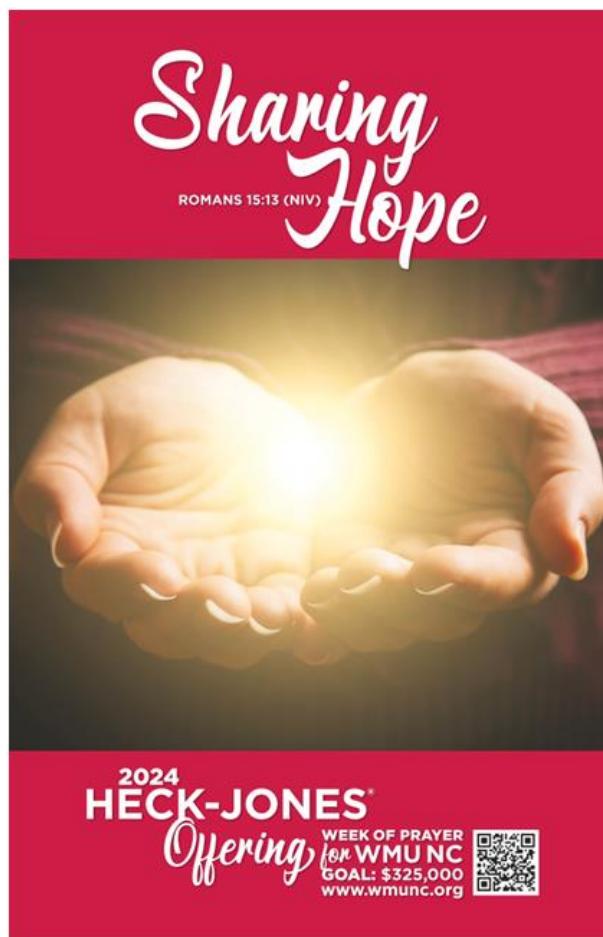

A MESSAGE FROM Rev. Scott Faw, Rowan Southern Baptist Association Board of Directors

Dear Friends

February is here and I can imagine many of you are like me and you are ready for the warmer weather that spring brings. I thought I would share some interesting thoughts with you about preaching this month. In particular first sermons. First sermons aren't usually known for their profundity (mine certainly was not). Truth is mine was pitiful. They are usually fairly short, despite the uncomfortable pauses and nervous stuttering. All Luke tells us about Paul's first sermon is that "he preached Christ...that he is the Son of God (Acts 9:20). It sounds as if even the great apostle's first sermon was short and simple.

I remember the night at our church, I preached my first sermon. People told me I did a great job, and everyone was extremely proud of me. I have never listened to the sermon, even all these years later (I was 15 and hadn't been saved long, it was a youth Sunday), but now I blush a bit at it, like all preachers do when they listen to themselves from the perspective of maturity.

I have to say though, while my first sermon surely wasn't the best I have ever delivered (they aren't great now), that night some people picked on me because I wore a coat and tie to church that night. That Sunday, I was getting ready for my homiletic debut, people asked if I was attending a funeral as they had never seen me in a tie except for the occasional funeral. As I look back on that night, I am reminded in many ways I was preparing for a funeral. It was mine, because I had to die to himself in order to do what God had called me to do.

Over the years I am thrilled I have said no to Scott and yes to Jesus over and over. What a truth! Jesus said in Luke 9:23, "Then He said to them all, "If anyone desires to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me." Pay attention to that phrase, "take up his cross daily". Jesus was not referring to a piece of jewelry to be worn on a necklace. The cross was an instrument of execution. To take up your cross is akin to picking up your own coffin. There is a sense in which every one of us must have our own funeral. We must come to the point where we die to our own wishes, our own wants, and our own ways. We must die to self that we might live for Christ.

Paul put it this way. "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me." Galatians 2:20

I hope you gotten off to a good start in your churches this year and God gives you many souls for your labor. If I or any other member of the board can be of any help to you, please don't hesitate to reach out to us.

The WMU focus this year will be "Praying the Promises Of God". 1 Thessalonians 5:7 tells us to pray constantly. Prayer is simply talking to God. Prayer is an act of faith. Prayer should be a lifestyle, not something we do once daily and then check off our to-do list. God delights in hearing from you. He wants you to be in constant communication with him.



We need to breathe to live. Our body craves air. Nobody must remind you to breathe. It comes naturally; most of the time, you don't realize you are doing it. God wants us to be so aware of his presence that it becomes natural to talk to him throughout the day. He wants us to talk to him about our work, relationships, interactions, and decisions.

The disciples watched Jesus perform miracles, heal the sick, teach, and love others. They also watched him pray to the Father in heaven. Jesus made prayer a priority and saturated his life with prayer. The disciples didn't ask Jesus to teach them to perform miracles, to teach, or to heal the sick. They wanted to know how to pray because they watched Jesus pray. They witnessed how important prayer was to Jesus. If Jesus spent much of his time in prayer, how much more time should you and I spend in prayer?

The Bible tells us to pray. Jesus modeled praying. He encourages us to pray often, specifically, and to pray in faith. But most of us struggle in our prayer life at some point. We get busy with life, distracted, discouraged, or impatient waiting for answers.

The spring event will be on Saturday, March 23rd at Emmanuel Baptist Church. I'm excited about this upcoming event because we will have a unique opportunity to enhance our prayer life. We will be making prayer Bibles. A Prayer Bible is a tool to help you use scripture to pray specific, bold prayers. It contains different themes such as anxiety, healing, joy, and strength. If you or someone you are praying for is dealing with anxiety or sickness, you can turn to the color-coded tabs and pray specific scripture for the issue. A Pray Bible is a place to keep ongoing or long-term prayer requests and answers to those prayers. We will walk you step by step to create your Prayer Bible.

You will need to bring a Bible to the event. Highlighters, colored tabs, and other supplies will be provided for you. The Bible can be any translation you like to read. It will be best to bring a Bible that does not have tabs for the books of the Bible because you will be adding many tabs to the pages. This will not be your everyday study Bible or one you carry to church. This Bible will be used during your prayer time and be in addition to your regular Bible.

I hope you will make plans to attend the spring event. We will meet from 10:00 to 12:30 and brunch will be provided. The cost will be \$15.00 which includes supplies and brunch. Door of Hope Children's Mission – Where Every Child Matters

In the Gospels, Jesus demonstrates His heart for children by His willingness to devote time to them, by recognizing their importance and by His passion for protecting their innocence. The Door of Hope Children's Mission is a faith-based organization that strives to reflect Jesus' heart, and be His hands and feet, to the destitute children of South Africa.

Thousands of babies are abandoned every year in South Africa – 2 out of every 3 dies. Door of Hope is on a mission to rescue as many babies as we can.

Since 1999 Door of Hope has taken in 1,887 babies who have been abandoned. In 2023, Door of Hope rescued 34 babies, 12 who were safely relinquished through our Baby Box. 25 babies were adopted and 9 were reunified with family members. Door of Hope normally has 60 to 70 babies being cared for in 2 baby homes in Johannesburg.

Door of Hope is partnering with NC Baptists on Mission to develop a Village that will house abandoned children and infants who need a family.

We are building homes that will accommodate a mother (or mother and father) where up to 6 children can be brought into a family. The Village will include helpful amenities, including a medical clinic, Early Childhood Development Center, a library, sports fields and vegetable garden. As we create a larger, Jesus-loving community, the children can thrive in a healthy and holistic/holy environment.

Door of Hope seeks to partner with mission-minded churches to further God's desire for His children to care for children who have been orphaned. February 4, 2024

Brad and Jen started Mercy Hill Church to reach a densely populated neighborhood of 78,000 people in a three-mile radius. Less than 10 percent of the people in their East Indianapolis neighborhood are connected to an evangelical Protestant church.

To reach people, Mercy Hill is partnering with the resource center of the local school district to help provide for and connect with the underserved families in the community. The church has also engaged families with the Gospel through a Vacation Bible School at a nearby park.

Sports were a huge part of International Mission Board worker Wes Blakely's world. Now, sports play just as big a part in his ministry on the mission field.

Blakely has been coaching sports in a school and a few clubs in Central Asia. Through this, he's seen people become curious about Christianity and some even turn to Jesus. But Blakely couldn't foresee the far reach of his ministry.

Desiring better performances after the latest Olympics, government leaders extended an invitation for Blakely and friends in the U.S. to bring their expertise in athletics and training. They'd be given influence over thousands of coaches.

Blakely never hides the fact that he is a Christian and that his faith shapes what he teaches and how he coaches.

He shares that sports, coaching, athletics – all of it – should be seen from a biblical worldview. Most importantly, as with everything in life, it should all be used for God's glory.

“We were praying for the Lord to use sports to influence people, but we had no idea that this door was going to be opened. We realized, ‘Okay God, you are way bigger than we realize, and you’re seeking to reach this whole society.’”

Pray for God to bring people to himself in mighty ways through this Christ-centered sports ministry. Some names may be changed for security.



February 18, 2024

Woongje (OONG-JIE) and Injoo Chun (IN Joo Cheon),

Nearly a third of all Koreans in Georgia live in Gwinnett County. To engage those Koreans with the good news, Woongje leads an evangelism team to the Korean market every Tuesday and Thursday. Many young Koreans hear and respond to the Gospel each week during these efforts.

February 25, 2024

On a trip to the closest city, International Mission Board missionaries Jason and Robin Ebeyer were praying to find a “person of peace” – someone who would welcome them and help in their ministry efforts.

The Ebeyers have been working for the last few years with the people in Isan, a region in Thailand that had no Christian presence.

When the Ebeyers stopped to get coffee, they met Tia. She was a Buddhist and knew the cost of leaving her religion. She'd be betraying her family.

When the Ebeyers met Tia, she was extraordinarily kind and patient as she served them coffee. They repeatedly returned to her coffee shop and explained the gospel to her. The Lord did a work in her heart, and she prayed to receive Christ.

Tia blazed the trail for the Ebeyers' outreach to the village. Seven people made professions of faith in less than two months.

“She is the quintessential ‘person of peace,’” Jason said. “She opened her heart, opened her home and opened the door to the village where we’ve been ministering.”

Pray for the Ebeyers to be encouraged by God's work in people like Tia as they reach the lost people of the village.

UKRAINIAN

Ukraine's population today is roughly 46 million, while about 355,000 and 5,900 Ukrainians now reside in the United States and North Carolina, respectively. The primary religion practiced by the Ukrainians is Orthodox Christianity.

Russia's invasion of Ukraine in February 2022 has prompted nearly 8 million Ukrainians to flee their homes. The majority of these refugees have resettled in neighboring Russia, Poland and Germany, while estimates suggest 150,000 have landed in the United States. They live primarily in the Triangle, Metro Charlotte and Blue Ridge.

- Pray that Ukrainians amid fear and uncertainty would find ultimate hope in Christ.
- Pray that N.C. Baptist churches will have opportunities to love Ukrainian refugees in their community, bringing them the hope of the gospel.

RUSSIAN

Russia's population today is roughly 145 million, while about 852,000 and 5,600 Russians now reside in the United States and North Carolina, respectively. The majority of Russians claim Christian Orthodoxy or Judaism as their religion, although the majority of Orthodox Russians are nominally religious.

The majority of Russian people who immigrated to the United States came from the European region west of the Ural mountain range, specifically from the Russian metro areas of Moscow and St. Petersburg. They live primarily in the Triangle, Metro Charlotte, Fayetteville, Blue Ridge and the Triad.

- Pray that God would use the Russo-Ukrainian War to draw Russians to himself.
- Pray that N.C. Baptists will find ways to partner with evangelical Russian churches to advance the gospel among this people group.
